Catechizing Corner!

Luke's passion narrative was written from the same perspective as that of his entire collection, comprising the gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles. Jesus is the one who always, from his very birth, was faithful to the law of Moses. He was also the one who extended mercy, love, and forgiveness, who spent his earthly ministry in a forward movement to Jerusalem. Luke also portrayed the disciples in a very positive light. He made no mention of the fact that they fled the scene. Throughout his gospel, Luke prepares the reader for the events that will continue in his second volume, the Acts of the Apostles. Jesus in judgment before the Roman court looks ahead to Paul who will stand before the same court. The forgiving Jesus who forgives his murderers looks ahead to Stephen, the first martyr who acts in like manner. Thus, Luke shows the progression of salvation through Jesus from the Old Testament law and prophets, through his life, passion, death, and resurrection and then to the church.

Jesus' last words demonstrate his unfailing trust in his Father's will. The consoling words of Christ in his last breath, "Into your hands I commend my spirit," have ushered many a soul peacefully into the loving arms of God at the moment of death. In the end, the Roman centurion attests to Jesus' innocence, adding another Roman witness to Jesus' blamelessness: "so that time wise on either side of the cross a Roman governor and a Roman soldier have made the same declaration of not guilty." Luke's ultimate purpose in the passion narrative was to portray Jesus in death as he was in life: the one who healed, the one who showed more concern for others than he did for himself; the one who offered divine love, reconciliation, and forgiveness even from the cross.
