Catechizing Corner!

The first metaphor used in Matthew's account of the sermon on the mount is the metaphor of salt. In the ancient world salt was used as a means to preserve food. Thus it was logical for salt to be used as a symbol of preservation and permanence. Salt was also used for purification of people, conquered lands, and sacrifices. Salt was also a sign a possibility. People who lived together were united in a sacred bond of friendship through the sacred sign of salt.

The second metaphor Matthew uses is light. Light is the primary symbol in our church today. Disciples are called to be the light of the nations, by their life and examples they are to reveal God to the multitudes, just as Jesus did by the sacrifice of his life. The reference to a city is probably an allusion to the lights of a city at night. Scholars suggest that Isaiah 2: 2-5 serves as a backdrop of this image. Jerusalem, a city built on the mountain of Zion. was used to be the place where the light of the Lord would be revealed to the world. Disciples are to become the beacon on the hill, the city that lights up the world. There are salt and light because Jesus calls them and they responded. They are therefore expected to reveal what they are. They are to let their light shine for all to see, and to show by their behavior that they are salt and light in the midst of darkness.

This is not an exhortation to an individual. The "you" is plural. Today's gospel is a challenge to the community as a whole. Matthew's exhortation emphasizes the universal and corporal mission of the church. We are all in this together. To be light is the job of everyone as a unified body. The church is called to be visible.
