Catechizing Corner!

Luke does not use the word transfiguration. Luke says: "His face changed in appearance." Jesus had an "Ah-ha" moment, the kind that knocks us off balance, makes us shake our head in incredulity and say, "Wow!" Jesus experienced an incredible insight, and it was reflected on his face. All of a sudden it all makes sense, Jesus understands the big picture. Now he knows what needs to happen and why. His death was not to be the end of his mission, but the fulfillment of it. His death meant liberation. He had to go to Jerusalem; it was the only way. His mission on earth was accomplished. There was nothing left for him to do. He left a living legacy, a living memorial. Jesus had to die. He had to "give his life as a ransom for the many." Through his death, the gates of heaven would be opened and his ministry of healing and liberation would last forever. It made perfect sense.

Jesus' face had to change. The revelation was so profound, that it was "written all over his face." Profound revelation is often accompanied by a change in facial expression, such as happened to Hanna when she learned she would have a child (Sam 1:1). Some of the stories of early martyrs reflect a changed expression on their faces. "The members of the Sanhedrin who sat there stared at him intently. Throughout, Stephen's face seemed like that of an angel" (Acts 6:15). In other instances we are told of martyrs who went to their day of victory cheerful and bright of countenance. Thus, from Luke's version of the transfiguration, it is possible to conclude that the theophany on Mount Tabor was for Jesus an encounter, a turning point, and the impetus to go forward to Jerusalem, to his ultimate death.
