Catechizing Corner!

In the final part of the "Sermon on the Plain," Jesus tells four related parables "concerned with the matter of Christian influence." Jesus is concerned with forming disciples to assist others in the ongoing process of formation. Disciples learn disciple ship from other disciples. Jesus instructs them in the Christian way of life. In order for disciples to lead and challenge others to live the way, they must themselves be models of the way. Thus, selfcritical analysis must be a way of life for followers of Christ. How can one effectively lead others without engaging in his or her own ongoing process of renewal and conversion?

We are not to take this parable as an exhortation against fraternal correction. . Just because the disciple is a sinner does not mean that he cannot engage in correction for the sake of the community. It is not expected of a disciple that "he should live and let live and be blind to moral imperfections about him. Such a stance would give the green light to evil and spell the end of mutual admonition in the community." Rather, the point is: one must look at oneself before seeing the imperfections of others. Jesus brings the point home with a touch of ironic humor. Imagine a plank protruding from the eye of an unreflective disciple! Preposterous! It is just as preposterous to assume that disciples would correct one another without ever examining their own interior dispositions and behavior.

Jesus points the way for teachers through his use of metaphors. Blind people need the sighted to lead them. The ignorant need the knowledgeable to teach them.

but when fully trained, every disciple will be like his teacher.

Why do you notice the **splinter** in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own? How can you say to your brother, 'Brother, let me remove that splinter in your eye,' when you do not even notice the

wooden beam in your own eye?

Gospel Glossary

splinter: a tiny piece of wood

hypocrite: a person who acts one way in front of some people and different with other people.

You hypocrite! Remove the wooden

beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye.

"A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit. For every tree is known by its own fruit. For people do not pick figs from thornbushes,

nor do they gather grapes from brambles.

A good person out of the store of goodness in his heart produces good, but an evil person out of a store of evil produces evil; for from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks."
