Catechizing Corner!

The fig tree was a symbol of God's blessing of the land of Israel. In Deuteronomy it is named as characteristic of the promised land. The fig tree is the only tree mentioned in Adam and Eve's paradise. Destruction of the fig tree also represents a curse on the land. Thus, the fig tree was used as a metaphor for blessings and curses. Good figs were illusions of the righteousness and bad figs to the unrighteousness. Ultimately the common biblical metaphor of the fig tree was associated with the blessing of God and the dawning of the messianic age The tree in today's story is barren and fruitless. To illustrate how barren the tree was, we are told that it is beyond the third year of cultivation, which, under normal conditions, would mean that the tree was beyond restoration and would have to be cut down. However, the tree was given a reprieve, one more chance, one more hope for growth. It is suggested that Jesus point was clear. Just because the tree was not cut down, did not experience God's judgment, and was given a reprieve, does not mean that it was not deserving of the judgment or punishment. By all normal standards, it should have been cut down. It was spared only because of the vinedresser's mercy. Regardless of righteousness or the lack of it, the tree was allowed to remain simply because of God's mercy. The implications? All must repent, turn from no growth--death-- to new growth-- life. The parable indicates that mercy is available for all who were present in time."

planted in his orchard, and when he came in search of fruit on it but found none, he said to the gardener, 'For three years now I have come in search of fruit on this fig tree but have found none. So cut it down. Why should it exhaust the soil?' He said to him in reply, 'Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future. If not you can cut it down.'''
